The project team will present an update on the Highway 99/Bear Creek Greenway Corridor Re-visioning Project to a joint meeting of the City of Phoenix City Council and Planning Commission. This memo accompanies the presentation with an additional summary of the project, including overall objectives, outcomes to date, and upcoming next steps in Phase 2 of the project.

Background

In early September 2020, the Almeda Fire began in northern Ashland and moved north up the Highway 99 and Bear Creek corridor through the cities of Talent and Phoenix, as well as unincorporated Jackson County. Altogether, the fire destroyed approximately 2,500 residential properties, including approximately 1,500 manufactured homes in 18 mobile home parks and approximately 180 commercial properties. Southern Oregon suffers from a substantial lack of housing affordable to local residents. The Almeda Fire has exacerbated this affordability problem. The vegetation along the Bear Creek Greenway, a 20-mile, paved, multi-use trail that links the cities of Ashland, Talent, Phoenix, Medford, and Central Point, suffered major damage as well. A significant portion of the destroyed housing, including manufactured housing, was located in the Bear Creek floodplain or floodway. This will impact redevelopment options and, potentially, the affordability of replacement housing.

Project Area

The project area comprises the land along the Highway 99 / Bear Creek Greenway corridor between the city limits of Medford and Ashland, including properties inside and outside of the Almeda Fire burn scar that are adjacent to both sides of Highway 99, and properties between Highway 99 and the Bear Creek Greenway (See Figure 1). The project considers connections to Highway 99 and the Bear Creek Greenway from areas outside the immediate Project Area. The project also considers portions of unincorporated Jackson County adjacent to Phoenix city limits.

Project Description and Objectives

The Highway 99/Bear Creek Greenway Corridor Re-visioning Project is a two-phase project funded by the Oregon Transportation and Growth Management (TGM) Program, in partnership with Jackson County and the Cities of Phoenix and Talent, to develop a comprehensive vision and implementation strategies for future growth and development in the area that was impacted by the Almeda fire in 2020. Consistent with TGM's mission, the project supports multi-modal transportation options (e.g., walking, biking, transit) throughout the corridor, increased housing opportunities, and mixed-use hubs that improve destination accessibility and reduce the need for motor vehicle travel.

Phase 1 Outcomes

Phase 1 of the project, a visioning and strategic planning process, is nearing completion. Some descriptions below include links to highlighted project documents. All key project documents are available on the project website at https://hwy99-bear-creek-vision.squarespace.com/.

- Meaningful community engagement and reflection. A Project Advisory Committee (PAC) and a Citizen Advisory Committee (CAC) were established and met at key points to provide input, review interim findings, and make recommendations. In addition, planning team members interviewed community stakeholders to seek feedback about the expectations for the project and the values of the community. A project website was created to provide real-time project updates and a community survey was used to identify issues and opportunities in the study area.
- Review of Existing Conditions and Opportunities. The project team analyzed existing
 conditions, recognizing the challenges and opportunities of the post-fire landscape, which has
 resulted in conditions that are different from those on which existing plans are based.

- Development Feasibility Analysis. The project team evaluated increased housing opportunities
 and types (especially affordable housing types) through mixed-use nodes of
 commercial/residential development along Highway 99, including a review of opportunities and
 constraints for zoning districts along the corridor.

- Placemaking¹ Recommendations. Based on the input from two in-person workshops, the
 project team developed design recommendations and other suggestions for placemaking for the
 City of Talent and the City of Phoenix, including green infrastructure strategies to mitigate
 flooding and improve multi-modal transportation.

- Comprehensive Plan and Code Evaluation. The project team analyzed existing development
 regulations in the three partner jurisdictions relative to the project objectives to support multimodal transportation and mixed-use hubs along the Highway 99/Bear Creek, and developed
 recommendations to better align the development regulations in the three jurisdictions to
 support vibrant mixed-use development.

¹ Placemaking is the creation of public spaces in a community for the purposes of strengthening connections between people and the places they share. Next Steps: Phase 2

Phase 2 will develop recommendations for the Comprehensive Plan and development code amendments to implement the strategic vision and direction identified through Phase 1. This will include:

- Comprehensive Plan and development code amendments for increased affordability and mixeduse, multi-modal development, including design concepts.
- Policy recommendations and improvements to increase safety, visibility, and connectedness to the Bear Creek Greenway.
- Any required analysis to support policy and code amendments.
